Available Tax Credits

Residential: A one-time credit of 30% of the total investment (with no limit) for all residential direct expansion geothermal heat pumps installed before December 31, 2016.

Commercial: The credit is equal to 10% of expenditures, with no maximum credit limit stated. Eligible geothermal energy property includes geothermal heat pumps and equipment used to produce, distribute or use energy derived from a geothermal deposit. For electricity produced by geothermal power, equipment qualifies only up to, but not including, the electric transmission stage. For geothermal heat pumps, this credit applies to eligible property placed in service after October 3, 2008.

Save your receipt showing the cost of the qualifying product along with this certification. Certifications need not be submitted to the IRS, but should be kept on file in case the IRS has questions. We suggest that you consult with a tax advisor for further information on claiming the credit on your federal tax return.
